LIFELINE-CONNECT...A ROADMAP TO CHANGE

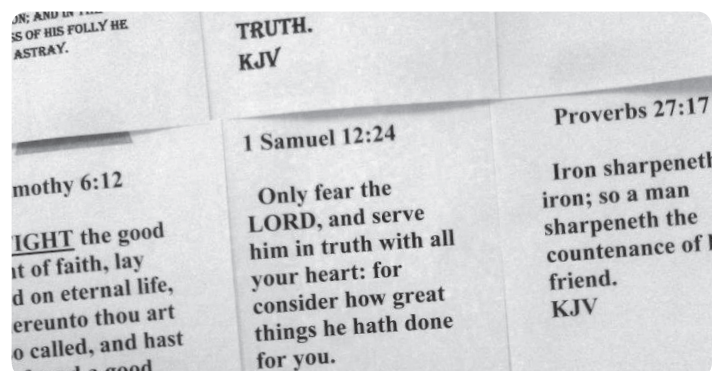

Of course they are able to change thanks to the grace of God and turning their hearts toward Him. Fear is overcome as they place their faith in Jesus Christ and His salvation.

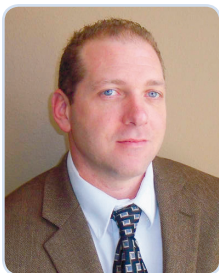

I would describe my life before Lifeline-connect with Psalm 31:10–12, “For my life is spent with grief, and my years with sighing; my strength fails because of my iniquity, and my bones waste away. I am a reproach among all my enemies, but especially among my neighbors, and am repulsive to my acquaintances; those who see me outside flee from me. I am forgotten like a dead man, out of mind; I am like a broken vessel.” I now live by Romans 12:2, “And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God.”

“The biggest change in my attitude is who I am. If asked to describe myself, I would have told you I was a real estate appraiser. Now I respond, ‘I am a child of God with all the disciplines and privileges of a Christian man.’ The Bible tells us in 2 Corinthians 5:17, ‘Therefore, if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature; old things have passed away, behold, all things are become new.’”

Brian Doubek

“My mental state was one of hopelessness. My self-pity and resentments were at an absolute high water mark. The insanity of the things I did were incredible. The extremes I went to to get money for drugs were devastating to my credit and me. I truly used heroin to live and lived to use heroin. But even when I had it, I was mostly miserable and fake. The worst were the mornings when I got up. I would swear off using at night, but wake up so sick from withdrawal and depression I had to use. I could truly understand why people committed suicide.

My life is so much better now that my thinking has changed. I try to put God first to the best of my ability. The classes have taught how to do this, as well as the instructors. I've learned how to avoid temptation, how to pray, and the reality of salvation. I've gotten rid of old resentments that made me miserable. I have changed thinking patterns like gossip, fault finding, pride and vanity to a very large degree. I have no desire to use or self medicate. I can take life on its terms. I have a long way to go...change is ongoing...but I'm well on my way. I have no or very little denial, I admit when I am wrong and truly try to turn my back on that behavior. This is not behavior modification. It is true change.”

Lifeline-connect is E-X-P-A-N-D-I-N-G

Yes! After three years of public hearings we have the “green light” to expand the ministry of Lifeline-connect. We are authorized to house up to twenty-four men. This means a new dorm and training center are being planned. It will be constructed on the present campus. Most of the time we are at capacity so we need this expansion to accommodate all the requests for enrollment. Of course the LC staff has to grow with the enrollment as does the financial support base. Because this is such a genuine and indisputable need we have no hesitation in asking for financial support. Cars, Truck and Van Are Needed

Many of our supporters have asked us to let them know when we have needs. We are currently in need in several areas. With the approval to expand we will need to raise funds for the new dorm. We are seeking out different resources and ask that you pray with us for the Lord’s direction and provision.

We are also in great need of donated vehicles or a financial donation to purchase them. We need a couple program cars. One to use for program transportation needs (2 or 3 men attending a class, grocery runs, etc). We are currently using a 15-passenger van for all errands, and of course it

is not very gas efficient and is costly. The other car is for Phase 3 residents who are at least 1 year into recovery, live off campus, work a job, begin managing money and day to day life yet with accountability.

LC also needs a work truck and we will very soon need to upgrade our van for group transportation as ours is on its last leg and in constant need of repairs. This is the first time we have ever “asked” for donations for vehicles. They have always just happened. The Scripture says, “Ask and you shall receive!”
